Course Description

This course provides a general introduction to the study of basic psychological processes. At the end of the course, you will have introductory-level knowledge of: the basic subfields of psychology, scientific methods in psychology, and the major theories and processes in biological, cognitive, learning, and language areas of psychology.

Course Format

This course will largely be lecture based, but class time will also consist of discussions, demonstrations, and activities. Students are responsible for *all* material covered in lectures and in the textbook. Classes will include *some* (but not all) aspects of the textbook, as well as some additional material that does *not* appear in the textbook.

Content on midterms and the final exam will be largely drawn from the **lectures and class activities.** In addition, textbook readings have been assigned. Questions on tests will also be drawn from the textbook readings. In addition, students will be asked to participate in various learning and research activities for course credit.

Class attendance is strongly advised. There will be announcements made in class regarding exams, course material, research participation, etc. If you are not in class, you will still be held responsible for being aware of these announcements. It is important that you obtain contact information from two fellow students, so that you are able to contact others when you have missed a class (or classes). **The instructor cannot respond to emails asking to repeat information presented in class or on the syllabus.**

Midterms & Final Exam

This course will include 4 multiple choice tests. Each test will include multiple choice items and be worth 24% of the final grade. Content on tests will be based on lecture content and textbook readings. The Final Exam is non-cumulative and will be scheduled by the Registrar's Office at a later date. Calculators, cell phones, ipads, computers, books, and notes are not permitted during tests. Students must bring pencils, erasers, and their student ID card to each test date. Bottled water is also permitted.

Course Credits for Research Participation

Experiential-Learning/Article-Evaluation Course Component (4% of final grade)

This experiential-learning/article-evaluation component provides enriched learning opportunities in this introductory course. You can complete this component by participating in research studies (Option 1: Research Participation), by completing 1-page article evaluations from a designated list (Option 2: Article Evaluations), or by a combination of the two options. Thus, you will learn more about psychology by taking part in research studies and/or by reading and evaluating articles from a psychological perspective.

Option 1: Research Participation. Students can complete this course component by creating an account and participating in Departmentally approved research studies at http://ucalgary.sona-systems.com. Students earn 0.5% (0.5 credits) for each full 30 minutes of participation. Each study will be followed by an educational debriefing experience. The demand for timeslots may exceed the supply in a given term. Thus, students are not guaranteed that there will be enough studies available to them to meet their credit requirements. Students should seek studies early in the term and should frequently check for open timeslots. **The last day to participate in research and allocate credits is Dec 7, 2018.**

Option 2: Article Evaluations. Students can complete this course component by reading and evaluating articles. Students earn 1% (1 credit) for each acceptable evaluation. Students can submit only one evaluation per due date (**September 21, October 12, November 2, November 23, 2018**), late submissions will not be accepted. Please consult the Blackboard for this course for more information about this option.

Option 3: Combinations of Options 1 and 2. Students can complete this course component through any combination of Options 1 and 2 (e.g., 3% through Option 1 and 1% through Option 2, or vice versa). Given that each article evaluation counts for 1%, students who complete, for example, 2.5% through Option 1 would need to complete two evaluations to successfully complete all 4% of this course component. As mentioned under Option 2, students can only submit one article evaluation per due date, late submissions will not be accepted. Thus, students who opt to combine Options 1 and 2 must plan ahead carefully.

Dr. Hughes' Class Policies

Class Attendance: Class attendance is strongly advised. Students should always plan to attend class unless for documented medical, compassionate, and extra-curricular reasons. All tests are dependent upon attending the lectures.

Class Schedule: Dr. Hughes will make every attempt to start and end class on time. If class schedules need to be adjusted, this will be done with the students' best interests in mind.

Email Policy: Dr. Hughes will make every effort to respond to student emails within 48 hours. If an email does not receive a response within 48 hours, please send it again. Do not email the Instructor concerning assignments or exams within 12 hours of the deadline for said assignment or exam. Please include the course number somewhere in the email (subject header, your signature, etc.). **The instructor cannot respond to emails asking to repeat information presented in class or on the syllabus.**

PowerPoint Policy: The PowerPoint slides will be posted within 24 of the completion of each Unit. PowerPoint slides will be posted in full, with the exception of any personal photos or videos. External links used in class will be embedded in the PowerPoint file.

Laptop/Cell Phone Policy: Student may bring laptops, cell phones, and electronics to class for the purpose of taking notes and recording lectures. Please sit in the back of the classroom if you will be multi-tasking with a large screen which may distract those behind you.

Audio Recordings: Students are permitted to make audio recordings of the lectures with their personal devices. However, students are not permitted to post recordings of class online or share publicly.

Exam Questions: Exam questions will be designed to be fair, clear, and valid measures of your knowledge of the course material. Exams will be designed to distinguish between students who actively "took" the course, and students who did not attend or study. Questions on the exam will **NOT** include "all of the above," "none of the above," or obvious trick questions. After completion of the final exam, Dr. Hughes will conduct a critical item-analysis of each exam question. Any questions that were deemed unclear or unfair will be dropped or considered bonus items.

Extra-credit and reweighting: Students are eligible to participate in Department approved research and earn credits toward their final grade. Aside from course credit for research participation, students will not be given any additional "extra" credit to improve their grades. In addition, students' grades will not be "re-weighted" to compensate for their missed tests or assignments.

Grading: Grades on assignments and tests are not rounded. Final course grades out of 100 are rounded to the next letter grade if they are within 0.51% of the next letter grade interval. For instance, a 79.49 would be rounded to an 80 on the final grade. A 79.48 would not be rounded.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology professors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

As stated in the University Calendar, it is at the instructor's discretion to round off either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades. To determine final letter grades, final percentage grades will be rounded up when within 0.51% of the next letter grade (e.g., 89.49% will be rounded up to 90% but 89.48% will not).

Reappraisal of Grades

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class; no reappraisal of term work is permitted after the 15 days. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within 15 days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Students should examine sections of the University Calendar that present a Statement of Intellectual honesty and definitions and penalties associated with Plagiarism/Cheating/Other Academic Misconduct.

Absence From A Test/Exam

Makeup tests/exams are **NOT** an option without an official University medical excuse (see the University Calendar). A completed Physician/Counselor Statement will be required to confirm absence from a test/exam for health reasons; the student will be required to pay any cost associated with this Statement. Students who miss a test/exam have up to 48 hours to contact the instructor and to schedule a makeup test/exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam. At the instructor's discretion, a makeup test/exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled test/exam. Except in extenuating circumstances (documented by an official University medical excuse), a makeup test/exam must be written within 2 weeks of the missed test/exam during exam make-up hours provided by the department http://psychology.ucalgary.ca/undergraduate/exam-and-course-information#mues. If a student cannot write their final exam on the date assigned by the Registrar's Office, they need to apply for a deferred exam http://www.ucalgary.ca/registrar/exams/deferred final.

Travel During Exams

Consistent with University regulations, students are expected to be available to write scheduled exams at any time during the official December and April examination periods. Requests to write a make-up exam because of conflicting travel plans (e.g., flight bookings) will NOT be considered by the department. Students are advised to wait until the final examination schedule is posted before making any travel arrangements. If a student cannot write their final exam on the date assigned by the Registrar's Office, they need to apply for a deferred exam

http://www.ucalgary.ca/registrar/exams/deferred final. Students with an exceptional extenuating circumstance (e.g., a family emergency) should contact the Department of Psychology (psyugrd@ucalgary.ca).

Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP) Act

The FOIP legislation disallows the practice of having student's retrieve tests and assignments from a public place. Therefore, tests and assignments may be returned to students during class/lab, or during office hours, or will be made available only for viewing during exam review sessions scheduled by the Department. Tests and assignments will be shredded after one year. Instructors should take care to not link students' names with their grades, UCIDs, or other FOIP-sensitive information.
