# **Course Description and Objectives**

This component will provide students with an overview of theory and ethical practice regarding people from marginalized and/or racialized groups. It will address unintentional racism and systemic discrimination in psychological theory and practice and provide an opportunity to develop skills in working with people whose experiences; cultural values and norms; and health beliefs differ from dominant group populations in Canada.

#### **Course Format**

Lectures will be taught live via Zoom during each scheduled class as per the course schedule below and will be recorded and posted to D2L after class. Attendance is required.

# **Prerequisites**

Admission to the Graduate Program in Psychology or by permission of the Instructor.

## **Required Text**

France, M. Honoré, Rodriguez, M. & Hett, G.G. (2013). *Diversity, Culture and Counselling: A Canadian Perspective* (2<sup>nd</sup> Ed.). Calgary: Brush. Available in Campus Bookstore or online. Some additional readings will be posted in D2L.

#### **Assessment Methods**

- 1. Students will work in groups of two or three (depending on class size). Each group will be assigned readings to focus on and will lead a class discussion exploring the topic's implications for counseling/research practice. It will also explore how the COVID pandemic is differentially impacting the populations your group is studying. EACH student will meet with at least one member of his/her/their assigned target community to determine some of the needs/concerns/expectations of clinical psychology services. The findings will be incorporated into the group presentations. This can be done over a video/web-conferencing platform. Absence from your group presentation will result in a 0% for that student. 50%
- 3. Each class, students will come prepared to discuss the assigned readings having prepared at least 3 thoughtful questions or points of interest for discussion (these will be submitted to the professor by email after each class). 25%
- 4. Students will submit a thought paper (no more than 6 pages) in a .docx format by email about their experiences in the course. They will answer the following questions: 1. What was your most powerful learning in this class and how will you apply it to your practice?; 2. What gaps (if any) exist in your training or ability to work with member of disadvantaged groups?; 3. How can you close these gaps (if any); 4. How has the pandemic differentially affected the group you worked with?; and 5. How can you be more effective when working with diverse populations including working through an antiracism/oppression lens?. 25%
  - **DUE December 11**. Late assignments will not be accepted without prior discussion with your professor.

#### Absence From A Test/Exam

Makeup tests/exams are **NOT** an option without the approval of the instructor. Students who miss a test/exam have up to 48 hours to contact the instructor to ask for a makeup test/exam. It's the instructor's discretion if they will allow a make-up exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam.
