Course Description from Calendar

A survey of research and theory in cognitive psychology. Research on pattern recognition, attention, memory, language, thinking, and other cognitive mechanisms. Includes discussion of brain regions.

2. Chapter Article Paper (15% of final grade; 6-8 double-spaced pages). A random assignment of students to chapters will be posted by UCID on Blackboard. Using PsycInfo, Web of Science, Google Scholar, or another means, find an empirical journal article (i.e., one that reports an original experiment) that updates or challenges a claim made in an empirical journal article referenced in the assigned text chapter. The article you choose cannot be referenced in the text. You must be the first to post the article

reference in APA format on Blackboard within the appropriate text chapter forum to lay claim to your article. No two students can use the same article (note: doing so will result in an F grade on the paper). In Part 1 of your paper (3-4 double-spaced pages; 7.5%), describe the first study, and then describe the second study and explain how it updates or challenges our understanding of the relevant cognitive process. In Part 2 of your paper (3-4 double-spaced pages; 7.5%), critique the second study and then either 1) propose an original third study and explain how it could further our understanding of the relevant cognitive process while addressing your critique, or 2) find, cite, describe, and critique a third empirical article that has already attempted to achieve both these ends. Papers must be completed using the **ChapterArticlePaper.docx** file as it is formatted and posted on Blackboard. Papers should be submitted in class on the due date. Late (or early) papers will be accepted only via the green box outside A275 and should be given to the TA, not the instructor. Emailed assignments will not be accepted. Late papers will be accepted only if received within 1 week of the due date, and will be penalized a full letter grade (e.g., a "B+" paper will receive a "C+" grade).

Reappraisal of Grades

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within 15 days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Students should examine sections of the University Calendar that present a Statement of Intellectual honesty and definitions and penalties associated with Plagiarism/Cheating/Other Academic Misconduct.

Academic Accommodation

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations. If you are a student with a documented disability who may require academic accommodation and have not registered with the Disability Resource Centre, please contact their office at 403-220-8237. Students who have not registered with the Disability Resource Centre are not eligible for formal academic accommodation. You are also required to discuss your needs with your instructor no later than 14 days after the start of this course.

Absence From A Test/Exam

Makeup tests/exams are NOT an option without an official University medical excuse (see the University Calendar). A completed Physician/Counselor Statement will be required to confirm absence from a test/exam for health reasons; the student will be required to pay any cost associated with this Statement. Students who miss a test/exam have 48 hours to contact the instructor AND to schedule a makeup test/exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam. At the instructor's discretion, a makeup test/exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled test/exam. Except in extenuating circumstances (documented by an official University medical excuse), a makeup test/exam must be written within 2 weeks of the missed test/exam.

Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP) Act

The FOIP legislation disallows the practice of having student's retrieve tests and assignments from a public place. Therefore, tests and assignments may be returned to students during class/lab, or during office hours, or via the Department Office (Admin 275), or will be made available only for viewing during exam review sessions scheduled by the Department. Tests and assignments will be shredded after one year. Instructors should take care to not link students' names with their grades, UCIDs, or other FOIP-sensitive information.

Course Credits for Research Participation

Students in most psychology courses are eligible to participate in Departmentally approved research and earn credits toward their final grades. A maximum of two credits (2%) per course, including this course, may be applied to the student's final grade. Students earn 0.5% (0.5 credits) for each full 30 minutes of participation. The demand for timeslots may exceed the supply in a given term. Thus, students are not guaranteed that there will be enough studies available to them to meet their credit requirements. Students should seek studies early in the term and should frequently check for open timeslots. Students can create an account and participate in Departmentally approved research studies at http://ucalgary.sona-systems.com. The last day to participate in studies and to assign or reassign earned credits to courses is December 7, 2012.
